Re: Memo to Gardiner City Councilors regarding agenda questions

Dear City Councilors and Mayor Hart,

Please see the following questions I received from City Councilors regarding items on the agenda for March 20, 2024.

1. What exactly does SKCDC do at the building at 721 River Avenue in South Gardiner?

a. The South Gardiner location houses one of our Early Head Start classrooms, it houses the offices for our Home Visitors, as well as a teacher training space. The classroom serves eight children, and the home visitors have the capacity to serve 24 families. Head Start and Early Head Start programs provide free learning and development services to children ages birth to 5 from low-income families. Head Start programs operate locally to help young children from low-income families prepare to succeed in school, promoting children's development through early learning, health, and family well-being.
To achieve this Head Start programs deliver services to children and families in care group of

To achieve this, Head Start programs deliver services to children and families in core areas of early learning, health, and family well-being while engaging parents as partners every step of the way.

2. How many of the students served are from Gardiner?

- a. 45% of the children served are from Gardiner with other families from Gardiner, West Gardiner, Farmingdale, and Whitefield. Across all SKCDC facilities 20 families from Gardiner are being served. SKCDC has served families in the S Gardiner location for many years. As part of their lease arrangement, SKCDC maintains the facility. Recent improvements include a furnace replacement and a new playground Some other items to be aware of that SKCDC has done to support families in Gardiner:
 - i. On March 7, 2024 SKCDC coordinated a pop-up food event which distributed 10,000 pounds of food to local families and food pantries. This was in response to the need families articulated for food access created when the local Hannaford needed to close temporarily. Partners included SKCDC, Food For Thought, Chrysalis Place, The Good Shapard Food Bank and Student volunteers from Gardiner Area High School
 - On March 15, 2024 SKCDC provided a dental clinic at our Plummer St. Head Start location. This provided enrolled families access to dental care using a virtual dental home model.
