Hi Michael,

In regards to your inquiry about building a marijuana testing facility in Lot 11 of the Libby Hill Business Park my concerns would be the following:

1. I need to know what, if any, anticipated flows leaving the facility might be other than domestic wastewater from toilets, sinks, etc. According to USEPA Industrial Pretreatment Program (IPP) rules any process that contributes more than 5%, or 25,000 gallons of flow per day, whichever is less, of the 365 average daily flow of the receiving POTW (Publically Owned Treatment Works) or City Wastewater Treatment Facility, or contributes more than 5% of the biological treatment capacity must be classified as a Significant Industrial User (SIU) and obtain an IPP Discharge Permit from the City and may also be subject to Federal Categorical Pretreatment Standards. Also required if the process has a reasonable potential, in the opinion of the City, to adversely affect the Treatment Plant operation (inhibition, pass-through, sludge contamination or endangerment of City employees). Discharges must also be free of any heavy metals such as Arsenic,

Cadmium, Chromium, Copper, Lead, Mercury Molybdenum, Selenium and Zinc or volatile, semi-volitile or chlorinated hydrocarbons.

2. Any chemicals, waste generated from the tests or spent reagents would have to be collected in appropriate containers and sent to an approved disposal facility. All reagents and chemicals would need to be handled and stored in such a manner as to prevent accidental spillage into the sewer.

For your convenience I have attached a copy of the City of Gardiner Sewer Use Ordinance which will outline the above rules plus any others regarding discharges to the sanitary sewer. Please pay particular attention to Section 2821 (Definitions) par. C, E, G, H, K, L, N and S (a) plus all of Sections 2822 through 2830. You can also reach out to the Maine DEP Central Region IPP Coordinator Jim Crowley at 287-4860 for more information.

I will give you a call shortly to discuss your plans further. Please let me know if you need any more info.
