Proposed 2023-2024 MSAD 11 Budget

Dear Community Members of MSAD 11:

As we are coming to the end of another school year, I am grateful once again for the opportunity and privilege to serve the students of MSAD 11.

As a district, we continue to focus our goals on academic success for every learner. The effects of the pandemic have lingered, however, and made for some learning and social challenges. Our dedicated teachers and staff continue tirelessly to provide safe and positive learning environments while helping students work toward grade level learning.

This year, we embarked on a Strategic Plan for the district. We conducted it in a new and innovative way. This allowed us to have conversations with many people across the four communities that may have otherwise not been included. With the assistance of artificial intelligence, we were able to record the conversations, draw out common themes, and revisit stories for greater understanding. The report and recordings will be especially helpful as we assess ways to strengthen community engagement with our students and their families.

We recognize that there are ongoing challenges we face as a district. Adequate funding, staff recruitment and retention, and student mental health are just a few examples of the issues that require our ongoing careful attention and extra effort. Out of 257 school districts in the state, only 39 spend less per pupil than MSAD 11. If we want a strong educational system for our students, we must address some of our real financial barriers. This year, the highest cost drivers within the budget are: **Contracted salaries** - We found that when negotiating our employee contracts, we were far below area districts in our compensation. Doing a market analysis showed that our ability to hire and to retain excellent employees required us to become more competitive. A hard but true reality. **Utilities** - Heat and electricity are the highest we have experienced to date. **Special Education** continues to be one of the highest costs in our district. As you look through the provided materials, please take note of the graphs and the percentages and costs as provided by the Finance Committee with the assistance of our Business Manager.



(20-A M.R.S. § 1485)

TO: Stephanie Houdlette, a resident of Maine School Administrative District No. 11 (the "District") composed of the City of Gardiner and the Towns of Pittston, Randolph, and West Gardiner, State of Maine.

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify the voters of each of the municipalities within the District, namely, the City of Gardiner and the Towns of Pittston, Randolph, and West Gardiner, that a District Budget Meeting will be held at Gardiner Area High School Gymnasium, 40 West Hill Road, Gardiner, Maine at 6:00 P.M. on June 6, 2023 for the purpose of determining the Budget Meeting Articles set forth below.

ARTICLE 1A To elect a moderator to preside at the meeting.

Explanation: The District's contribution to the total cost of funding public education from kindergarten to grade 12 as described in the Essential Programs and Services Funding Act is the amount of money determined by state law to be the minimum amount that the District must raise and assess in order to receive the full amount of state dollars.

The School Board Recommends \$4,911,672.48, which exceeds the State's Essential Programs and Services allocation model by \$4,911,672.48. The School Board gives the following reasons for exceeding the State's Essential Programs and Services funding model: These funds are needed to fund costs of supporting four community schools that the Essential Programs and Services funding model does not recognize, to provide greater academic support in the form of educational technicians in District classrooms than the Essential Programs and Services funding model recognizes, to pay for co-curricular costs not recognized by the Essential Programs and Services funding model, and to pay for transportation costs not recognized by the Essential Programs and Services funding model.

Explanation: The additional local funds are those locally raised funds over and above the District's local contribution to the total cost of funding public education from kindergarten to grade 12 as described in the Essential Programs and Services Funding Act and local amounts raised for the annual payment on non-state funded debt service that will help achieve the District budget for educational programs.

ARTICLE 14 SUMMARIZES THE PROPOSED SCHOOL BUDGET

ARTICLE 14

To see what sum the District will authorize the School Board to expend for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2023 and ending June 30, 2024 from the District's contribution to the total cost of funding public education from kindergarten to grade 12 as described in the Essential Programs and Services Funding Act, local funds for non-state-funded school construction debt service, additional local funds for school purposes under the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 20-A, section 15690, unexpended balances, tuition receipts, state subsidy, and other receipts for the support of schools.

ARTICLE 15 AUTHORIZES THE ADULT EDUCATION PROGRAM AND RAISES THE LOCAL SHARE

ARTICLE 15

To see if the District will appropriate \$271,000.00 for adult education and raise \$105,450.00 as the local share, with authorization to expend any additional, incidental, or miscellaneous receipts in the interest and for the well-being of the adult education program.

ARTICLE 16 AUTHORIZES EXPENDITURES OF GRANTS AND OTHER RECEIPTS

ARTICLE 16

In addition to amounts approved in the preceding articles, shall the School Board be authorized to expend such other sums as may be received from federal or state grants or programs or other sources during the fiscal year for school and other program purposes, provided that such grants, programs or other sources do not require the expenditure of other funds not previously appropriated?

ARTICLE 17 AUTHORIZES A TRANSFER TO AND EXPENDITURES FROM THE CAPITAL RESERVE FUND

ARTICLE 17

Shall the School Board be authorized to transfer **\$80,797.00** from available fund balances to the Capital Reserve Fund and to expend from the Capital Reserve Fund as needed in the discretion of the School Board?

ARTICLE 18 ESTABLISHES AND AUTHORIZES CONTINGENCY FUND TRANSFERS ARTICLE 18

Shall the District authorize the School Board to establish a non-lapsing contingency fund for periods of financial emergency pursuant to section 1482-B(3) of Title 20-A, and to transfer the District's unallocated balances in excess of 9% of the prior fiscal year's budget, as determined by audit, to that fund; and shall the District delegate authority to the School Board to expend sums in the contingency fund when the School Board determines by public vote that an emergency need exists, and to transfer sums in the contingency fund to the District's general fund for use in school operating budgets approved by District voters?



Local vs. State Funding 2023-2024








This school year has been focused on rebuilding community within our schools and helping students grow socially and academically after years of disrupted learning. With new instructional resources in place and more familiar school routines, staff have worked incredibly hard to know where students are at in their learning and help them make gains.

Our goal is to help all children succeed. To achieve this goal, we have implemented new literacy and math programming K-8 recently. This year, we redesigned our system of support so that we could more quickly respond to individual student learning challenges and celebrate growth.

To know if students are making gains, we look at student work and the results from different types of assessments. In the elementary grades, for example,


iReady Math K-5 District Typical Growth Average: Fall to Winter



one of the tools is the iReady math diagnostic. As you can see from the chart, students across the district continue to improve year over year. The goal in the winter is to have a district average of at least 50%. This year, the average typical growth was at 56%. Every year, our students are improving.

Students learn best when they are able to be at school routinely. It was a bit challenging this year because we all experienced an increase in non-Covid illnesses. We know that when students are healthy and at school, they will have stronger peer relationships and will learn more. Our attendance data has improved with an average daily attendance rate of 94%. Students who miss 18 days or more are considered chronically absent. It is concerning that more than a quarter of our students are missing that many school days. We will continue to partner with families so that all students can access learning.





In a collaborative effort across all of our school communities, we will continue to provide students and families with opportunities to feel a sense of belonging, feel respected and valued, and feel prepared to learn. We will continue to work on helping our students learn, communicate, and think critically. We are proud to serve our MSAD 11 communities.

The 2022-23 Adult Education program has had a busy and successful year offering opportunities for our adult learners under current circumstances. Here are some facts about this academic year at MSAD #11 Adult Education.

- Registered and served 80 learners (to date of this newsletter) in our literacy, high school completion, workforce, and college/career transitions programs.
- Provided in-person and online instruction to our High School completion programs and College & Career transitions students.
- Collaborated with MaineGeneral to prepare and graduate 54 Certified Nurse's Assistant students, increasing instruction to offer two cohort classes running at the same time.
- Established and expanded relationships with a broad range of enrichment instructors and local businesses to provide beneficial community courses.
- Maintained online learning opportunities with Ed2Go and LERN, giving access to over 500 online learning courses for adults through our website.
- Developed and established consistent weekly communication to our learners, supporters and customers using existing and new tools in our social media, website, and email lists.

We continue to participate in and receive state and federal grants. These income sources allow us to serve adults with low literacy skills through our Adult Education and Family Literacy Act (AEFLA) program. Our Maine College and Career Access (MCCA) grant funding is used to provide transitions courses and advising for adults preparing for careers and/or college.

As you consider the adult education budget, please keep in mind that the local warrant in the amount of \$105,450 acts as both funding for our academic programs and as a foundation from which to leverage other resources. This amount has been the same request to taxpayers for the past two years. Local taxation, state subsidy, carry-forward and program-generated receipts will combine to build a budget of \$270,962.53 for the 2023-2024 fiscal year. In the coming year, we anticipate similar individual and community needs. Other increases and the adjustments of expenses, including both federal and state grants, will permit ongoing leveraging and use of human and technology resources in the coming year.

We will continue our mission to provide adults with educational opportunities needed to succeed in their roles as employees, family members, and community participants. We strive to provide a welcoming, adaptable, and accessible learning environment that meets individual and community needs.
