

Whereas Edward Lawrence of Pittston and Charles Lawrence of Gardiner in said County Yeoman and Hancock of Boston and Henry W. Fuller of Augusta did petition the Court of Sessions holden at Augusta within and for the County of Kennebec on the first Tuesday of Aug. A. D. 1823. Representing that the selectmen of said town of Gardiner in the month of March last past did lay out the following described Town Way in said Gardiner for the use of said Town of Gardiner - viz: Beginning at a stake and stone on the south side of the Brunswick road near Robert Harmons Blacksmiths Shop - Thence running South  $2^{\circ}$  East 68 rods - Thence South  $20^{\circ}$  East 106 rods to a Birch stump near Benjamin Peacocks. Thence South  $28^{\circ}$  East 120 rods to a stake and stone near Jordan Libbys - Thence South  $19^{\circ}$  East 150 rods to a marked stump near the East line of John Huntingtons Lot. The marked line to be the westerly side ~~of said~~ of said road and to be three rods wide. Thence South  $60^{\circ}$  East 51 rods - Thence South  $52\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$  East 23 rods to the Corner bound between Jacob Bowkers and Charles Lawrences lot - Thence South  $67\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$  East 100 rods to the line of said lot - Thence South  $62^{\circ}$  East 28 rods to a marked stump - Thence North  $78^{\circ}$  East 104 rods to a marked stump - Thence North  $70^{\circ}$  East to the south end of a stone wall near James Costellows - Thence East  $10^{\circ}$  North 52 rods to a marked Beech Tree. Thence East  $2^{\circ}$  South 36 rods to a hemlock tree. Thence East  $5^{\circ}$  South 122 rods to the river road near David Lawrences. The marked line from the east line of John Huntingtons lot is intended to be the centre of said road - and to be three rods wide and the same Town Way was reported by said Selectmen to said Town of Gardiner at a public meeting of the inhabitants held for that purpose on the first Monday of April last. And was by them at said meeting approved and allowed.

On the petition of John Plaisted and ten others inhabitants of the town of Gardiner, and in pursuance of notice publicly given according to law, the undersigned Selectmen of the town of Gardiner have proceeded to view a location for a street leading from High St. towards the paper mill, and also a continuation of Summer Street from its present termination to intersect said street, as requested by said petitioners, and have laid out so much of the same as is herein after described viz: Commencing on High Street at the N. E. corner of Wm. H. Springers lot thence running South 26 $\frac{1}{2}$  to West about 105 rods passing on land of W. H. Springer, Ray Thompson, Elishalet Pray, Samuel Amee, Robert H. Gardiner and John Plaisted to a stake standing in said Plaisted's field distant at right angles from the line between the land of said Plaisted and said Gardiner about                      the above described line to be the westerly line of said street and the street to be three rods wide.

EXTENSION OF HARRISON AVENUE.

Beginning at a stone bound about 105 rods from High Street, on the northerly side of and at the westerly extremity of Harrison Avenue heretofore laid out: thence south sixty-nine degrees and forty minutes west four hundred twenty-nine (429.0) feet to an iron bound: thence the same course two hundred eighteen (218.0) feet to an iron bound: thence south twenty-seven degrees and twenty-three minutes west nineteen hundred ten (1910.0) feet to an iron bound: thence south sixty-nine and three-fourths degrees west six hundred thirty-four and one-half (634.5) feet to an iron rod in a stone: thence south sixty-two degrees and thirty-eight minutes west four hundred sixty-nine and one tenth (469.1) feet to an iron bound on the east side of West Street.

Agreeably to public notice given according to law the undersigned Selectmen of Gardiner have proceeded to view a route for the location of a way leading from the Plaisted road (so called) south easterly to Summer Street and have laid out the same as a town way as follows viz: Beginning at a stake on the easterly line of said Plaisted road and three rods south 63° east from the north easterly corner of George Moores lot thence running south 63° east forty rods and five links to a stone thence south 47 $\frac{1}{4}$ ° east fourteen rods to a stone thence south 56 $\frac{1}{2}$ ° east twelve rods to Summer Street, crossing the land of R. H. Gardiner and Mrs. E. Harden.

The damages to be paid by the town to Mrs. Harden are estimated by the undersigned at the sum of One hundred and twenty dollars \$120.00, to R. H. Gardiner nothing.

The foregoing courses and distances correspond to and continue the town road as now travelled.
